So you thought there wasn't any snow in February? Would you believe there was more this year than the rugged winter of 1982?

Spencertown Meteorological Observer Arlington Race submitted his weather data for the second month today which shows total snowfall for the 28-day period was 29% inches, compared to only eight a year ago.

There were seven clear, 10 partly cloudy and 11 cloudy days, with a maximum temperature of 54 on February 28 and a minimum reading of 12 below zero on February 11. Total precipitation, including rain, sleet and melted snow was 2.72 inches.

Total snowfall this winter to date is 45% inches, compared to last year's 92% record.
