2 Schenectady Men Become Bankrupts

UTICA, June 12—Living expenses caused Joseph D. Casey, 2 Fuller street, Schenectady, to file a suit for bankruptcy in U. S. court here today. He has no assets and owes \$1,119 to 20 creditors. These include Ellis Hospital, \$58; Dr. William F. Nelson, \$38; Douglas H. Andrew, \$139, and Central Stores, \$158, of Schenectady; Ward Armory Sales Room, Albany, \$133; John Pawling, merchant, \$88; and various stores, also of Schenectady, can not pay debts of \$3,133, according to a petition filed by him. He turns his assets of \$1,175 over to the court for the benefit of creditors. New York Power Corporation has a claim on an icing machine to secure \$800. Armour and Company of Albany claims \$177 and Associates Discount company, also of Albany, \$80.

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King Seeks Settlement of Vatican, Italy Dispute

ROME, June 12 (INS)—King Victor Emanuel of Italy today was understood to have intervened for the first time in the controversy between the Vatican and the Italian government over the recent dissolution of Catholic youth associations.

Senate President Federzoni was acting for the government in official conversations regarding an amicable adjustment of the dispute at the behest of the king. Both official and semi-official negotiations were being continued in an effort to end the affair.

Federzoni's participation in the dispute pointed directly to the interest of the royal palace in obtaining an immediate settlement of the controversy. The King is adverse to the present schism between his church and his government.

The Vatican was reported to have completed its reply to Premier Benito Mussolini's note of Tuesday. Monsignor Borgognoni-Duca, papal nuncio to the state, holding a long conference with Pope Plus XI today, during which he was given secret instructions.

SCION OF N. Y. FAMILY FACES BIGAMY CHARGE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12 (INS)—Thornton Lothrop Motley, of a prominent New York family, was awaiting trial today on charges of bigamy brought by his second wife. Mrs. Yvonne P. Motley charges that when Motley married her last August he was still the husband of Mrs. Anabel P. Motley, Cleveland society woman, and that newspaper accounts of the first Mrs. Motley's divorce suit gave her first knowledge that she was not legally married.

NEW ATTACK ON JAIL FEARED

ST. CLAIRSVILLE, O., June 12 (AP)—More than 40 deputies were held in readiness today for a second attack threatened by leaders of a crew of 2,000 striking coal miners and women sympathizers who were beaten away from the Belmont county jail last night. Seven persons were arrested and 12 overcome by tear gas.

It was the first serious outbreak of the week-old strike in Eastern Ohio, which has affected mainly 1,000 workers. Prosecutor Paul Wadell and R. A. Ireland, manager of the M. A. Hanna Coal company of Cleveland, said they

Railroads to Ask 15 Pct. Increase in Freight Rates

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—The railroads of the nation stood united today behind a decision to petition the Interstate Commerce commission for a general increase of 15 per cent in freight rates.

Representatives of Eastern, Western and Southern groups of roads who participated in the agreement reached yesterday said which rate increases are automatically suspended for that period.

A general increase of 15 per cent was decided on to make the question one of revenue rather than one involving individual rates to prevent long debate.

Although the petition will be for a general increase, the roads do not intend, representatives said, to increase all rates by that amount.

ALL GROUPS JOIN

The first move toward seeking the increase was made by representatives of eastern and western roads a week ago. After their plans had been agreed on they presented the proposal to traffic officials of Southern roads at a meeting in Washington. The result was the meeting here yesterday in which all three groups joined.

The committee appointed to present the application consists of John J. Pelley, president of the New York, New Haven and Hartford; H. A. Scandrett, president of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul & Pacific, and W. R. Cole, president of the Louisville & Nashville.
